SOARING OVER MARSH ROAD AT FIRST, THEN FLEW A SHORT DISTANCE TO WNW WHERE IT INTERACTED WITH THE OTHER BIRD IN A SPECTACULAR MANNER

THE PLUMAGE OF BOTH BIRDS WAS QUITE SIMILAR WITH ONLY SMALL DIFFERENCES IN THE AMOUNT OF WHITE IN THE UNDERWING PATCHES. THESE PATCHES AT THE BASE OF THE INNER PRIMARIES & OUTER SECONDARIES WERE QUITE SMALL (NOT VERY NOTICEABLE). THESE BIRDS WERE LARGE, DARK BIRDS OF PREY EXCEPT FOR THE WHITE TAILS WITH BROAD DARK BAND AT THE TIPS. ALSO THE GOLDEN HACKLES WERE SEEN AS THE BIRDS WHEELED IN THE BRIGHT SUNNY, ~~DAY~~ <sup>BLUE</sup> SKY. THE BIRDS GAVE A RELATIVELY SMALL-HEADED LOOK, ESPECIALLY AS COMPARED TO THE ADULT BALD EAGLE SEEN BEFORE & AFTER
