- 7. OTHER OBSERVERS WHO INDEPENDENTLY IDENTIFIED THE BIRD(S):
- 8. LIGHT CONDITIONS (RELATIVE TO OBSERVER): partly cloudy with mostly continuous sunshine; bird in all directions relative to observers and sun direction
- 9. OPTICAL EQUIPMENT: 10x40 Zeiss binoculars
- 10. **DISTANCE TO BIRD**: 15-40 yards
- 11: **DURATION OF OBSERVATION:** 45-50 minutes, off and on
- 12. **HABITAT**: mixed brush and small trees. Understory consisting of elderberry, baccaris (sp?), etc. Trees mostly chinese tallow.
- 13: NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION OF OBSERVATION; BEHAVIOR: Muth initially saw the bird, which we search for for about 30 minutes. Upon re-finding it, we watched it--for about 20 minutes--as it frequently perched in small bare trees, once in a live oak, vocalizing several times. At one point, after many attempts, Wallace and I were able to see the diagnostic tail pattern. Finally, Muth retrieved a tape from the car which was played for 15 minutes off an on. The bird reacted vigorously to the taped song of Brown-crested, flying all around us, vocalizing, flicking its tail, etc. Showed no reaction to Ash-throated tape. It showed some response to my simulated W. Screech Owl call.

- 14. **DESCRIPTION OF BIRD**: Large-ish flycatcher (Great-crested size), dull light brownish with fairly pale yellow underparts, gray throat and face, brownish crown, fairly heave black bill, rufous on wings, rufous tail with outer web of outer rectrices darker rufous-brown extending to tip of tail but not bleeding into "j-like" pattern. Strong white edging to tertials (4?).
- 15. **VOCALIZATION(S), IF ANY**: The bird gave a sharp "whik!" or "wheek!, lacking any buzzy quality, several times. In response to Brown-crested tape, it gave an agitated "whik-whik-whik" and seemed to be giving part of Brown-crested song.
- 16. SIMILAR SPECIES AND HOW ELIMINATED: Ash-throated eliminated by tail pattern, but also by size and bill size, though in a very robust Ash-throated this judgement might be suspect. Also by differential response to taped calls and songs. Great-crested (unrecorded in LA in winter) eliminated by vocalization, but virtually eliminated by bill color.
- 17. RESOURCES USED IN IDENTIFICATION (FIELD GUIDES, ETC.): no guides, but taped calls used.
