8. <u>Other observers who</u> *independently identified* the bird(s): Dr. Van Remsen identified the bird from a photo the day before.

9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): Early morning, cloudy (overcast). Bird was on both sides of the feeder and perched in several trees at differing angles.

10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): 10x40 Zeiss Binocs and Nikon P-900 camera.

11. Distance to bird(s): 30 feet. Others were closer.

12. Duration of observation: The bird came to the feeder or perched for view 6-8 times for 10-15 seconds at the most. At the feeder it was present only for a few seconds, sometimes longer.

13. Habitat: Urban. Jackie had lots of flowering hummer plants.

14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Bird was feeding but went into a defensive mode being very territorial when another hummer came by. It would then sit high and guard the area, defending the territory.

15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen;* include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species; body bulk, shape, proportions; bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently, stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*): Primarily, what stood out for me was the small size and proportionally large head with a short beak. When photographed, a few magenta feathers on the gorget and rear crown were evident as was a checkerboard pattern of slightly darker spots on the under sides. There was no reddish or buffy coloration seen on back, flanks, or other areas.

16. Voice: I could not hear the bird at these high frequencies. Others heard and recorded it.
