13. Habitat: Dan Lane's small but very birdy yard; at least four hummer species present with several feeders.

14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Periodically feeding at hummer feeder; guarding it against a RTHU.

Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen;* include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species; body bulk, shape, proportions; bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently, stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*): Large hummer, clearly 20-30% larger than RTHU or RUFU (present) and heavy-bodied. About the girth of a Ruby-crowned Kinglet. Full gorget extending down through auriculars to shoulder and over crown. Color of gorget dark while in shade, but when perched, it would ocassionally look my way, and parts of the gorget would reflect a pinkish violet-red. Bill dark and straight. Upper parts all green, underparts green to gray. Stakeout bird seen previously by several local birders and ornithologists.

16. Voice: Dan heard it singing, but I can't say for sure I did.

17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): No other NA hummer is this large with a gorget this color that extends over the crown.
