- 9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): Sunny but in a deciduous woodlot and the bird was mostly in the upper canopy.
- 10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Zeiss Victory SF 10 x 42
- 11. Distance to bird(s): @ 25 ft. on average

- 12. Duration of observation: 10 minutes total
- 13. Habitat: Mixed woodland with some Live Oak but the bird was typically seen on bare branches of deciduous trees and bare vines.
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): The bird appeared to be gleaning something from the leaves and branches but it wasn't apparent what was eaten. At one point the bird appeared to be attempting to leaf bathe but it seemed the leaves were dry. The bird would fly in and then fly out. The bird was periodically chattering and calling but I am not familiar with the song though I am familiar with Buff bellied and this was very different.
- 15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen;* include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species; body bulk, shape, proportions; bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently, stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*): The bird was emerald green above on the head and dorsal surface with a glittering sapphire blue gorget which extended down to green sides, breast and belly. The bird had a bright red broad-based bill with a dark tip. The tail was a dark bluish black with a deep notch unlike the long rufous-colored tail of a Buff-bellied.
- 16. Voice: Chit notes sometimes strung together, very unlike the loud sharp tchiking of a Buff-bellied.
- 17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Only bird close is a Buff-bellied which has a greenish-blue throat and pale belly with a long rufous-colored tail and narrower bill. It's call is unmistakably different as well.

- 19. Previous experience with this species: I have seen a Broad-billed in hand when accompanying Nancy Newfield banding hummingbirds
