- 13. Habitat: Woodlot next between a busy, four lane boulevard and the Millaudon canal levee. Low land, wet, but not a swamp. Hardwoods, vines and bushes. Full canopy, very shady.
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): First observation was for about 10 minutes and the bird was preening. It was perched about 15 to 20 ft up in a tangle of vines. The next 2 sightings were quick. He appeared to be gleaning leaves. He was vocal.
