- 8. Other observers who independently identified the bird(s): Glenn Ousset et al. This is a continuing bird since mid-December 2016, and poss/prob returning bird from previous (2015-2016) winter.
- 9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): Excellent; bird was observed with my back to sun, under bright light of sunny/clear day
- 10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Swarovski 8x30 binos (good condition), Nikon AF-S 300 mm 1:4 D camera lens (good condition)
- 11. Distance to bird(s): 10 m
- 12. Duration of observation: 5 min, viewed well for 1-2 min, plus another 2-3 min of bird around, calling occas.
- 13. Habitat: deciduous woods, at least partially flooded, near border with wet

scrubby/grassy veg, near park-like setting with scattered live oaks (cemetary) and large lawn (battlefield)

- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Came in to screech-owl/mobbing playback, perching high and investigating, somewhat agitated, calling occasionally.
- 15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen;* include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species, body bulk, shape, proportions, bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species): Obvious *Myiarchus* flycatcher (cardinal-sized passerine, grayish-brown above, grayish head and breast, yellowish belly, much rufous in flight feathers), superficially similar to Ash-throated and Great Crested flycatchers—see below.
- 16. Voice: Distinct "whip" calls with notable liquid quality
- 17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): All other North American *Myiarchus* eliminated by distinctive, liquid "whip" call. Ash-throated "pik" call harsher, and lacks "thick" or "liquid" quality of Brown-crested. (Note: Ash-throated calls heard earlier in morning at Bayou Sauvage.)

Ash-throated also eliminated by larger/heavier bill, bushier crest, and lack of dark tips on outer rects (dark of outer rects did not curve across to cover feather tips, as on Ash-throated—unfortunately there is a branch obscuring this field mark in the attached photos). Great Crested also eliminated by paler gray head, paler yellow belly, and lack of pale spot at base of mandible (did not see tertials well enough to describe). Dusky-capped also eliminated by its lack of rufous in tail (and other characters).
