- 3. Parish: Plaquemines
 Specific Locality: @125 mile offshore straight south of the mouth of the Mississippi

- 9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): Birds were down sun, Sun behind me when looking at the birds. Skies mostly cloudy. Birds were also in the shade created by the ship.
- 10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Brunton Epoch binoculars 10.5x43 in great condition clean lenses. Photos taken with iPhone 6 through said binoculars
- 11. Distance to bird(s):from 20 yards out to 200 yards
- 12. Duration of observation: about 20 minutes
- 13. Habitat: Open Pelagic Ocean, Calm seas
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Viewed from deck 3 observation deck outside of the Carnival cruise ship Triumph. Birds flew in from the Southeast at a level of about 10 meters above the water, then paralleled the ship at that height flying from the stern to the bow along the starboard (Right) side. Then would

circle out away from the ship and fly back to the stern to repeat this process. The were watching for Flying fish that would fly to escape the ships wake, then drop down right behind the fish to pursue the fish along the top of the water. I did not see any successful chases. Eventually the birds flew off back to the east.

Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently*, *stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*): Was able to get excellent views from all angles of the birds. I recognized them immediately as Brown Booby. Overall brown coloration on the back and head and front of the neck ending sharply at the top of the breast. white underneath down to the feet and underwings from the axillaries to the second wing joint. Brown primaries. Pale face and bill in classic booby taper, blue eyes. Pale feet.
- 16. Voice: no vocalizations heard.
- 17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Juvenile Masked booby ruled out by lack of pale neck and yellow bill. No white collar around the base of the neck or white rump.

Juvenile Blue Footed Booby rules out by pale bill and feet instead of the dark bill and feet of the BFBO. Also no pale uppertail.

Juv. Red-footed Booby ruled out by Pale bill and feet instead of the dark bill and reddish feet expected on a RFBO, also by the solid white underbelly and white underwing coverts.
