White throat but with black collar and black streaking on sides against white belly. Black back with 2 white wing bars, and distinctive yellow lore. Eliminated Black-and-White, Blackpoll warbler with yellow spot on lore and behavior (sitting on branches unlike BAWW would, i.e not creeping on trunk).

16. Voice: Only one-two chip/contact notes heard, somewhat similar to Yellow-rumped Warbler but slightly different quality to sound

17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Black-and-White Warbler, Carolina Chickadee, Blackpoll Warbler. All birds eliminated with distinct yellow lore.
