10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Zeiss 10x40 binocular

- 12. Duration of observation: <1 min

13. Habitat: Live oak dominated woodland with other deciduous trees mixed in.

14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Briefly approaching in response to scold tape by the ditch along the road, but quickly moved on to the east deeper into the woodland. Cameron Rutt refound the bird deeper in, and he and I got one more view before it escaped detection again. Was foraging on distal branches of the live oaks and other trees, no creeping along branches. Flighty.

15. Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently, stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*): compact wood-warbler with white underparts with black flank streaks. White wingbars. Black-and white face pattern with black cheek, white supercilium, white malar with black whisker border, white throat.

16. Voice: a think "p'tic" similar but lower to that of Black-throated Green Warbler (which we also detected here).

17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Black-andwhite (also seen here) has distinctive creeping behavior, different body shape, only a male BAWW would have a black cheek, but would not have a black whisker and white throat, also would have black based undertail coverts (this birds' were all white). Different call note. Other warblers would have some yellow on face or breast.
