- 9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): Soft light: sky was partly cloudy when I saw the bird, which was perched somewhat in the open beneath a partially open tree canopy (not in deep shade).
- 10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Swarovski 8x30 binos (good condition), Nikon AF-S 300 mm 1:4 D camera lens (good condition)
- 11. Distance to bird(s): 20 m

- 12. Duration of observation: 2 min
- 13. Habitat: Large residential backyard with much natural vegetation/habitat and many bird feeders
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): I first noticed the bird flying away from a seed feeder (it had zipped in without me noticing, and didn't linger at the feeder--as was this bird's typical MO). But then, obligingly, it perched in a sparsely-foliated shrub about 5 m from the feeder, and 2-3 m above the ground, where it remained for about 2 min before retiring to parts unknown.
- 15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen;* include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species, body bulk, shape, proportions, bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species): An obvious oriole by size, bright orange underparts, tapering/pointy bill, etc. Bright orange supercilium, auriculars, neck, breast, belly, and vent; jet-black throat, eyeline, crown, and back; white upper wing coverts formed a large white patch on folded wing. Undertail (underside of outer rectrices) orange on basal 3/4, black on distal 1/4.
- 16. Voice: Not vocal
- 17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): This was an adult male and, as such, is very distinctive. Combination of black eyeline and throat, orange supercilium, auriculars, and underparts, and white wing patch eliminate all other contenders. No evidence of hybridization with Baltimore Oriole.
