was used to coax the owl out of vegetation along side the road where it was hidden. We drove down Calcasieu Drive and then Acadia stopping occasionally to play Burrowing Owl calls notes, and were successful in seeing the owl on Acadia. It first flew to the south side of the road were we caught a glimpse of it, and then a few seconds later it appeared in front of us on the road. As it flew off it gave distinctive BUOW chatter notes.
