1. English and Scientific names: Black-whiskered Vireo, Vireo altiloquus

- 4. Date(s) when observed: 11 and 18 APR 2015.

7. <u>Other observers accompanying reporter who also *identified* the bird(s): several. Dave Patton found the bird, and several other observers saw what appears from photos to be the same individual on this day and for many days after.</u>

8. Other observers who independently identified the bird(s): Many, I believe.

9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): Sunny, but under the canopy.

10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Zeiss 10s, Nikon D50 w/300 mm lens.

11. Distance to bird(s): At closest probably ca. 30 feet

12. Duration of observation: seen at various times throughout the 2 days, although rarely clearly. Perhaps 1-2 minutes of solid viewing time, most of which not good enough for pics.

13. Habitat: Remnant chenier woods, mostly in live oaks, perhaps by default—this species is the dominant tree in the woods.

14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): On 4/11, Dave called out that he had a BWVI, but as Dave was able to document it with a photograph quickly, I remained more concerned with a Lawrence's Warbler I was trying to photograph. Eventually I came upon the vireo and got sufficient looks at it. On 4/18 I saw the bird again, got a few photos, and later ran into Charlie Lyon and pointed it out to him.

A drab "red-eyed" type vireo differing in several respects from Red-eyed. Overall dorsal

color browner, or more olive-drab than Red-eyed Vireo. Crown cap more brownish or grayish-brown than REVI, without darker outline on border of cap and supercilia. Ventral color did not appear as bright white as REVI.

Whisker mark distinct and thick, running from base of bill along malar tract and seeming to end abruptly at about the level of the rear of eye.
