9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): Bird was in deep shade. Sun was straight up and almost blinding. Thank goodness for visors..

10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Steiner 8x42, Canon Rebel T3i, Sigma 70-300mm lens.

11. Distance to bird(s):20 to 25 feet.

12. Duration of observation: Short looks of a few seconds for a period of  $\frac{1}{2}$  hour.

13. Habitat: Persimmon tree grove on side of the road on the border of the state park.

14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation):It appeared to be gleaning insects from the leaves. Short flights from east end of grove to about the middle which is where I obtained a photo. However, it was quick and at the time, I thought I had gotten a picture of the YGVI since it was the target bird and was very vocal. No one had reported the Black-whiskered vireo yet.
