- 1. English and Scientific names: Black Whiskered Vireo (*Vireo altiloquus*)
- 2. Number of individuals, sexes, ages, general plumage (e.g., 2 in alternate plumage): 1, unknow age and sex, looked a lot like a red eyed vireo but more dull and larger beak. It had black stripes under chin which are the whiskers
- 3. Parish: Jefferson

Specific Locality: Grand Isle State Park, in the wooded circle area of the bath house

parking lot. In a willow tree on the main road just past the

entrance to the bath house.

- 4. Date(s) when observed: May 30, 2020
- 5. Time(s) of day when observed: Approximately 10 a.m.
- 6. Reporting observer and address: Kathy Rhodes, Houma, LA
- 7. Other observers accompanying reporter who also *identified* the bird(s): Darlene Eschete
- 8. Other observers who independently identified the bird(s): None present at the time Met 2 a couple from Harahan who saw the bird a little earlier in a Red Mulberry tree not far from where we found it.
- 9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): Clear day with strong morning sun. Bird was near top of tree with good lighting. Light winds, temperature in the low 80's.
- 10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Nikon Coolpix B600 camera no binoculars needed
- 11. Distance to bird(s): 25 feet (standing on ground close to tree, bird on top of small tree)
- 12. Duration of observation: 10 minutes

- 13. Habitat: Coastal, small grass/brush area near blacktop road and parking lot
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation):
 Bird was singing in the tree, eating on tree and flitting around close to same area in tree
- 15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen;* include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species; body bulk, shape, proportions; bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently, stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*):

Bird was singing loudly and frequently. I recognized the song from listening to voice recordings. Good sized warbler, long, dull green on top and light/creamy underneath. Saw the distinctive small black marks under the chin indicating the "whiskers". No wind bars.

- 16. Voice: loud and clear, sang frequently
- 17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Similar to red eyed vireo but larger and longer beak. Has definitive "whiskers", short black stripes under chin on each side
- 18. Photographs or tape recordings obtained? (by whom? attached?): Yes, by myself. Photos and short video.
- 19. Previous experience with this species: None, been on my "to find" list for years.
- 20. Identification aids: (list books, illustrations, other birders, etc. used in identification): Saw pictures bird before but most recently on eBird from other birders who reported.
- a. at time of observation: None, knew it was the black whiskered vireo
- b. after observation: Knew but confirmed with merlin app and National Geo. Field guide
