8. <u>Other observers who</u> *independently identified* the bird(s): When I arrived, Katie Percy, Nancy Newfield, Mark Meunier, Joan Garvey, and Cathy DiSalvo were already there and on the bird. Many others had seen the bird before and after me (fide LAbird and eBird).

9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): Sunny, light wind. The bird was mostly E and NE, in morning light, but not strongly silhouetted. Colors, including eye color, were visible with binoculars and a scope.

10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): 10x42 Swarovski EL binoculars, Swarovski 25-50x spotting scope, Samsung S6 smartphone camera

- 11. Distance to bird(s): About 50 feet.
- 12. Duration of observation: 20 minutes

13. Habitat: Old residential (vegetated with gardens and a mix of trees)

14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and

stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): When I arrived, it was sitting on the peak of a roof, looking east, and basically stayed like that for about 15 minutes. Then it turn 180 degrees and flew across the street, briefly landing on the house across there, and then dove down behind the house. I didn't see it re-emerge.

15. Notes at time of observation: "Yellow eye, splotchy below, grayish-brown back only slightly blending into smudgy underparts. Wings dull medium-brown; molt limit between s9 and s8 (=SY)."

16. Voice: Not heard

17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Unspotted below eliminates Brown and Long-billed Thrashers, and no white in tail or wings eliminates mockingbirds. Generally unpatterned and with a distinctly curved bill eliminates other potential long-shot vagrant mimids. Proportions and coloration wrong for any potential turdid. Distinctly yellow eye eliminates a lot of other passerines.

19. Previous experience with this species: Seen a few over several trips to TX, including one about a month ago (but with a much more distinctly orange eye).
