- 1. English and Scientific names: Cinnamon Teal (*Anas cyanoptera*)
- 2. Number of individuals, sexes, ages, general plumage (e.g., 2 in alternate plumage): 2 males in winter plumage (either formative and/or definitive basic, *per* Pyle 2005, Waterbirds)
- 3. Parish: Cameron Parish

- 8. Other observers who independently identified the bird(s): Deanna and Gordon Griggs found the birds and got us on them.
- 9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): overcast, even muted light
- 10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): 20 60x Vortex spotting scope, 10x42 Swarovski EL binoculars, Nikon D7000 camera with 80-400 mm f/4.5-5.6 VR lens
- 11. Distance to bird(s): about 200 feet

- 12. Duration of observation: about 15 minutes
- 13. Habitat: freshwater marsh
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): First bird found sleeping with head tucked at first, then after a couple minutes became active and swam to west. Then a second bird swam into view. After about 10 minutes, the two were swimming and foraging (dabbling) together with Blue-winged Teals. Neither bird appeared to be paired with a female.
- 15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen*; include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species; body bulk, shape, proportions; bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently, stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*):

One bird was brighter than the other. Both appeared to have red eyes and were essentially all chestnut red with darker scapulars. Both sides of the head were seen on both birds and neither appeared to have any indication of a Blue-winged Teal like crescent. Bill bluishgray and slightly longer than the neighboring Blue-winged Teals, but not as obviously long as a Northern Shoveler.

- 17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): The only possible source of confusion would be a hybrid, but there was no indication of a white facial crescent or other feathers that would indicate these were hybrids.
- 18. Photographs or tape recordings obtained? (by whom? attached?): Yes, by me.
- 19. Previous experience with this species: Seen several times out west and in Louisiana. Aware of the possibility of hybridization with Blue-winged Teals and other ducks, although I have never knowingly seen a hybrid.
