9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): Late afternoon light with mostly clear skies, direct sun.

10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Zeiss 10x40 binoculars, Swarovski 85mm angled telescope with 25-60X eyepiece.

11. Distance to bird(s): between 15-50 meters

12. Duration of observation: in total, about 15 minutes.

13. Habitat: disturbed woodland and field edge with several houses and lawns, small grove of Citrus trees, telephone wires.

14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): In all three observations, the bird was first brought in with playback of Couch's Kingbird, to which it responded aggressively, including calling. It perched at crowns of trees and on wires when first coming into view, retreating into tree interiors and perching lower once settling down. Some foraging maneuvers were observed when it pounced on unidentified prey items on ground.

15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen;* include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species, body bulk, shape, proportions, bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species): a large tyrannid with gray head, yellow belly, greenish back. Tail is brownish and deeply notched. Bill not quite as long as head and thick-based. Slightly darker mask on lores and on upper auriculars.

16. Voice: A buzzy "tr-ZEEEeeeer" and "kip!" notes given in response to playback. Not sound recorded.

17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Western Kingbird differs by tail pattern, whiter throat and upper breast, and voice. Tropical usually has a longer bill and very different vocalizations.
