- 13. Habitat: seen from parking lot surrounding by scrubby trees, in turn surrounded by marsh .... not very appropriate for this species

- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): soaring overhead; made one stoop to ground, out of sight
- 15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen;* include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species; body bulk, shape, proportions; bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently, stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*): noted and identified at 60 mph as we passed headquarters long wings with distinctive shape, slight dihedral, dark underwing coverts contrasting with pale remiges with dark tips. We turned around abruptly and were happy that the bird was still there. See photos for plumage details.

Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): The only raptor with a combination of dark underwings, pale remiges with dark tips, and pale on underside of tail would be dark Rough-legged Hawk. Differs from latter in lacking distinct black tail band, and in having whitish feathers in primary underwing coverts, reddish tones on upperparts. Also large bill and mouth evident in field, as was the distinctive wing shape of this species (difficult to describe but long and pointy).
- 18. Photographs or tape recordings obtained? (by whom? attached?): Amy Shutt was able to obtain several usable photos despite the bad light three cropped ones are attached as well as one of the non-cropped originals.
- 19. Previous experience with this species: Seen perhaps 100 times in CO, CA and elsewhere, including one dark morph, likely same individual bird from plumage details, a few weeks ago in Jeff. Davis Parish.
