9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): Bright ambient light given time of day and beach environs, but no glare due to partly cloudy sky

10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Swarovski 8x30 binos (good condition), Nikon AF-S 300 mm 1:4 D camera lens (good condition)

11. Distance to bird(s): As close as 25 m

12. Duration of observation: off and on for 50 min

13. Habitat: Foreshore and backshore beach

14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Loafing, initially on foreshore beach with other gulls and terns, then solo on backshore beach. Also flying (when flushed)

15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen;* include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species, body bulk, shape, proportions, bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species): Large white-headed gull, a bit larger than HERG (direct comparison). All-white, or off-white, plumage w/ buffy tinge on uppersides of primaries, underwing coverts, and upper surface of tail (at least bases of rectrices). Large/stout bill, well demarcated with pink proximate 3/4 contrasting with black (or near black) distal 1/4. Pink legs and feet. Flight feathers super ratty. Second cycle based on pale iris.

16. Voice: Not vocal

17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): From Iceland Gull by larger size and larger/heavier bill (based on direct comparison with Herring). This bird's typical Glaucous Gull bill size, structure, and coloration also eliminate albinistic/leucistic gulls, and other bleached-out gulls.
