9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): Good light, looking at bird to my ENE in mid-afternoon with the sun to my back, under mostly clear/sunny sky

10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Nikon Monarch 10x42 binos (good condition), Swarovski 80mm spotting scope (good condition), Nikon AF-S 70-300 mm 1:4.5-5.6 G camera lens (good condition)

11. Distance to bird(s): 20-30 m

12. Duration of observation: 10 min (during two 5-min bouts)

13. Habitat: border between mangroves and dry, grassy/Iva area with scattered sand flats north of beach

14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Consorting with two Eastern Kingbirds, sallying from, perching in, and flying among crowns of leafless (freeze-burned) mangroves and Iva shrubs.

15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen;* include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species, body bulk, shape, proportions, bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species): A large, robust kingbird with a heavy, black bill. Uniformly pale gray crown and back. Folded wings darker gray with white edging to coverts and flight feathers. Dark mask. White throat, breast, belly, and vent, with faint gray wash to sides. Tail wide and notched, dark gray above with brownish tones. Warm brown tones in tail and folded wing may suggest SY age (see photos; unfortunately I did not photograph the bird in flight or with wings spread).

16. Voice: Not vocal

17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Eastern Kingbird easily eliminated by direct comparison--see photos--upperparts paler gray, bill much larger/heavier, tail lacking white terminal band, and dark mask. Other large-billed kingbirds (e.g., Tropical, Couch's, Thick-billed) perhaps confusable at a distance in poor light, but easily eliminated here by all-white underparts, uniformly gray upperparts, etc.
