10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Swarovski 8x30 binos (good condition), Nikon AF-S 300 mm 1:4 D camera lens (good condition)

11. Distance to bird(s): 200-250 m

12. Duration of observation: off-and-on for 5-10 min

- 13. Habitat: landfill
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Seen in flight only, on 3-4 occasions when gulls flushed up from within landfill (out of sight to us) and flew around above the rim of the landfill. Several bouts of this occurred, with the gulls settling back down out of sight each time.
- 15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen*; include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species, body bulk, shape, proportions, bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species): A medium-large (about Herring-sized; larger than nearby Ring-bills, but not outrageously so), white-headed gull with completely white flight feathers. Body plumage appeared generally whitish, with what looked to be faint, beige vermiculations or mottling, but distance prevented making out such details. Bill appeared to be relatively small (e.g., relative to the bird's head size) and all-blackish, but the bird was too distant to see details regarding subtle color tones, gonydeal angle, etc.
- 16. Voice: Not known to be vocal
- 17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Glaucous Gull eliminated by relatively small, all-blackish bill--Glaucous's strongly bicolored bill would have been apparent even at 200-m distance and in photos. Leucistic Herring (or other large gull) probably eliminated by complete absence of darker tones in flight feathers.
