- 10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Leica 10x42 binoculars, Swarovski 25-60 zoom lens on 85mm scope.
- 11. Distance to bird(s): at closest, about 80m, and as far as 250m
- 12. Duration of observation: For most of 2 hours.

- 13. Habitat: Rust-colored settling pond with red mud borders and some grass and cattail edge.
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Mostly seen swimming, often associating with Black-necked Stilts. Flew on a few occasions, but returned to favored area.
- 15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen;* include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species; body bulk, shape, proportions; bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently, stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*): A small (passerine-sized) shorebird that was always seen swimming. Mostly white below, black ear patch and crown, needle bill. Dorsum was blackish with buff-white stripes on scapulars. White band on bases of remiges when it flew.
- 16. Voice: Surprisingly loud "pic pic pic" notes when in flight (recorded).
- 17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Red Phalarope would have thicker bill, less uniformly blackish back in similar ageclass.
