- 9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): Still mostly cloudy, but with somewhat better lighting conditions.
- 10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Vortex Diamondbacks 8x42 and Nikon D5600 with 55-300mm telephoto lens
- 11. Distance to bird(s): ca. 15-20 ft.

- 12. Duration of observation: Not very long, as we were stopped in the middle of the road and there was local traffic. Always not cool to block local traffic, we observed it long enough to document, so about three minutes.
- 13. Habitat: Tallow stands with roseau, houses, yards, road
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation):. Bird was mived in a flock of five WEKI and a STFL. The flock was moving from a small tallow stand with roseau, across the highway (road), into a yard with more tallow. It was pretty windy, so the birds were really just kind of on the move. The TRKI interacted with a WEKI in the tallows and both birds began heckling each other, vocalizing quite a bit.
- 15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen*; include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species; body bulk, shape, proportions; bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently, stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*): Yellow-bellied kingbird with bright yellow from undertail coverts, all the way up the chest, where the whitish throat contrasted nicely with the yellow, which now has a slight greenish tinge. Head dark gray with a pronounced black "mask" going through the eye. Bill noticeably longer than surrounding WEKIs. Mantle a greenish color, offset by dark tail.
- 16. Voice: a rising twittering, rising and falling end note with agitation against the WEKI
- 17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): COKI by voice (as well as the others), yellow extends higher up on chest than WEKI, no white trailing edges to outer rectrices, larger-billed than WEKI and CAKI, no white malar, as in CAKI.
