12. Duration of observation:  
Multiple individuals were around for several minutes but the whole group was only around for a few seconds.

13. Habitat:  
Aerial over lake and nearby open fields/woodlots

14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation):  
Group was aerial feeding and swirling around in the area.

Flock was continuing, but I believe this is the current high count. Individually counted as they were feeding overhead. The count was my max count but I easily could have missed some. All appeared uniform in size and structure. Obvious small dark swifts with very quick fluttering wingbeats. All appeared uniform dark with slightly paler throat. Appeared short tailed with broad based wings (about the width of the body) that were then evenly thin lacking any bulge to the secondaries.

16. Voice:  
Heard high pitch and thin chirps/twitters.

17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation):  
Lacked the bulging secondaries of Chimney Swift. Calls also distinctly higher-pitched than a Chimney Swift.

Attached in the e-mail are a couple photos. The photos show at least two individuals.

19. Previous experience with this species:  
Regularly (prior to this year) see Vaux's Swifts in migration and during the breeding season some years and was always on the lookout for a vagrant Chimney Swift (I've only seen the two species together once back in 2006). Have seen up to 27 Vaux's Swift this winter in the East Baton Rouge area (previously submitted). Regularly saw Chimney Swift this past fall, prior to that would be every couple years.
