Stress features that separate it from similar species): A large, long-necked, black-and-white grebe with long, greenish-yellow bill. Significantly larger than Ruddy Ducks (in general vicinity), and thus, by proxy, Horned or Eared grebes. Back, hindneck, and crown black, with black extending down on face to include eye; black contrasting with immaculate white auriculars, throat, foreneck, and breast (remainder of underparts not seen).

17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Clark's Grebe eliminated by black of crown extending down to include eye, and greenish-yellow bill color (not bright yellow as in Clark's)

18. Photographs or tape recordings obtained? (by whom? Attached?): Dan O'Malley got identifiable photos during observation; Charlie Lyon got very good photos upon discovering the bird 30 December 2015, and again on 6 January 2016
