Bird would occasionally sally off the branch to fly catch, but would return to the same snag throughout entirety of observation

Stress features that separate it from similar species):

Overall dark Pewee with strongly contrasting dark "vest" slightly lighter in the center of vest but not separating the two sides; yellow-ish belly with some dark spotting on undertail coverts; above the bird was a uniform gray color lacking olive tones; weak upper wing bar with bold lower wing bar; almost completely dark lower mandible with a little lightness at the base; light gray throat.

17. Voice: No vocalizations

Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Eastern Wood-Pewee - Eliminated by darkness of overall color on the bird; strongly developed "vest" and dark markings on undertail coverts; completely dark lower mandible favors Western over Eastern; as well as the weak upper wing bar; lacking olive tones throughout and showing a grayer appearance also favors Western over Eastern. Another point that Cin-Ty Lee made to me was about the photos showing p4 sticking out clearly beyond its longest tertial for WEWP which my photos do confirm.
